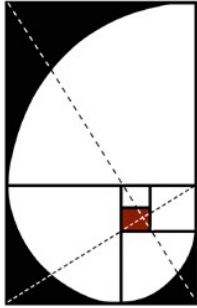

RISING SENIORS

All members of the Class of 2019 have met with Mrs. Cooper to discuss his/her plans after graduation. Each student has a summer plan customized to each student's personal needs. Ask your child about his/her summer plans or email Mrs. Cooper for a summary of your child's Junior Spring Conference.

All seniors will meet with Mrs. Cooper early in the fall semester to create a plan for seniors year. Keep an eye out for an email about these meetings if you would like to join the conversation.

There will be a Senior Parent Night and a Financial Aid presentation in September. If you would like to get a head start on financial aid this summer, I recommend completing the [FAFSA4caster](#). Although the FAFSA does not open for the Class of 2019 until October 1, the FAFSA4caster can give you an idea of what your Expected Family Contribution. This can help you estimate how much financial assistance your child may be given based on financial need.

SENIOR CHECKLIST: SUMMER

- Continue to research colleges. Visit college campuses if possible**
- Review SAT or ACT scores.** Register to retake 1 test if you would like to try to improve your scores.

RISING JUNIORS

Junior year is the time when students begin thinking more intentionally about their plans after MacLaren. Next school year, the Class of 2020 will discuss several of the practical aspects of the college search and application process, including how to pay for college. This summer, I encourage you to have conversations with your child about what he or she is thinking about doing after high school graduation. It is too early to expect many definitive answers, but these conversations are beneficial to spark thoughts and brainstorming. It is never too early to begin exploring colleges or visiting a few campuses, if possible.

Many colleges will send their representatives to MacLaren in the Fall. By the time Juniors are thinking more specifically about college in the Spring, few representatives are still traveling to high schools. Encourage your child to attend as many of these college visits at MacLaren during the Fall semester as possible. This is one of the simplest ways to learn about a college and make contact with admissions counselors, many of whom will be the one reading applications and recommending applicants for admission!

PSAT10 test scores have been released and your child will be receiving information to access his or her scores during oral exams. Juniors will take the PSAT again in October. This particular PSAT is used to identify National Merit Scholars. If your child is wanting to perform well on this test, encourage him or her to review scores and to take advantage of free test prep from [Khan Academy](#).

RISING SOPHOMORES

In 10th grade, the Class of 2021 will continue to explore options for education and career beyond MacLaren. They will begin to look at how their personal interests align with different education options. This will lead into discussion about different types of education and, eventually, the financial impact of post secondary education. Your child will learn about saving money for college, different types of financial aid and find resources for scholarships.

PSAT8/9 test scores have been released and your child will be receiving information to access his or her scores during oral exams. Sophomores will take the PSAT again in April. If your child is wanting to score well on this test, encourage him or her to review scores and to take advantage of free test prep from Khan Academy.

RISING FRESHMEN

There will be an information night for parents in the fall where all of the details of ICAP are explained.
